Special Presentation

The Rescue of Medical Students in Granada

Major General William J. Mall, Jr., USAF, shared with the FCOC members, his role in the “**Operation Urgent Fury**”, the rescue of the Medical Students in Granada. He was the Commanding Officer of the 23rd Air Force.



Early in the morning of October 25, 1983, the US invaded the island of Grenada. US President Ronald Reagan was informed of the over-throw of the leftist government and the execution of the Prime Minister by a Marxist coup. President Reagan saw the threat of the Soviet Union and Communist countries in the Caribbean. The shoot-on-sight curfew endangered the 1,000 medical students on Grenada. In addition, the present of Cuban troops constructing a 10,000 ft. runway that could land large Soviet planes, were the reasons for the invasion.



General Mall’s Command of the 23rd Air Force included the US Air Force Special Operations Command (AFSOC) that had a vast fleet of C-130 planes. These C-130 planes could carry troops and be configured as gunships. On

October 25, 1983, General Mall was in the third C-130 of a long string of aircrafts. The first two were radar guided. As the C-130s approached Grenada, a sudden bolt to lightning caused these planes to loose radar and they aborted. Now General Mall’s plane was first plane and he came in at 500 ft. to parachute the U.S. Rangers onto the runway. As the Rangers jumped, he saw the runway was barricaded to prevent any landings and heavy Russian anti-aircraft guns began firing golf ball-size shells. He realized the following 82nd Airborne Division would also have to jump. He directed the C-130 gunships to “neutralize” the anti-aircraft guns. As more airborne troops landed, they made their way to the Medical Universities and rescued the students.

The Island was secured by October 27th. There were 1,200 Grenadians, 780 Cubans, 39 Soviets and 24 North Korean on the island. At the end, 18 American troops died and 116 were injured.
