Captain Robert H. (Bob) Meyer, Army Air Corps

“Story of a Glider Pilot during WWII”



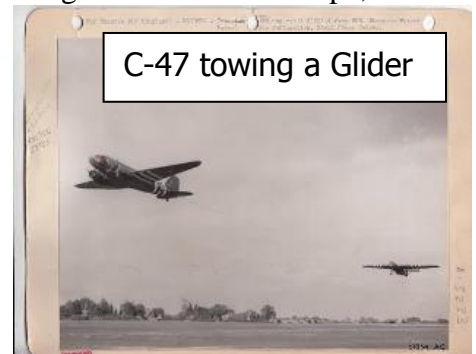
In World War II, gliders were the stealthy way to land troops and supplies behind enemy lines. Glider pilots had a simple motto, “Fly in-Walk out”. 70 years ago, **Bob Meyer** was accepted for primary flight school and completed all except the final flight. A medical problem disqualified on his final acceptance flight. At the same time, the Army Air Corps began a new program using gliders towed behind powered planes to insert troops. Bob Meyer was quickly accepted as glider pilot. He said, “Flying gliders is much safer than flying powered planes; no chance of an engine catching on fire!” The first combat mission for the 302nd Squadron, 441st Troop Carrier Group, 50th Troop Carrier Wing of the 9th Air Force was Operation “Chicago”, delivering the first troops for the Allied invasion of Normandy, France. His Squadron of thirty nine C-47 twin-engine planes towing one glider on an 11/16 rope,

350 ft. behind it. With the 13 glider squadrons, there was a string of planes 45 miles long. Flying at night at 1,000 ft. on June 6 1944, Bob remembers looking down at the English Channel and seeing at least 4,000 ships. The Waco glider CG-A4, made of tube steel and covered with canvas, could carry 15 troops, a jeep, or a 75 mm artillery cannon. Moderate to dense clouds covered the landing zones and the noon had set. It was dark! At 0126 hrs. the gliders began releasing from the tow planes. Unknown to the glider pilots, the landing zones were outlined with hedgerows. The hedgerows were made of trees, and rocks. Bob, exceeding all expectations, landed his glider without injuring any of the troops. Only about 10% of the gliders could be retrieved as many crashed or were shot down. The glider troops linked up with the paratroopers and held important ground against the Germans until the troops landed on the beach could link-up. The Glider Wing was awarded the Distinguished Unit Citation for the Normandy operation.

Capt Meyer went on to complete three more glider operations in the South of France, Holland and the Rhine landings. Only 12 WWII glider pilots of the 6,500 pilots made the four glider landings.
