Special Presentation

Major William E. Anderson, USAF (Ret.)

“Vietnam War Stories, North Pole Low Level - Norwegian Explorers, Japan Typhoon”

The love of flying came early for Major Bill Anderson. As a small boy in Pittsburg, PA., all his brothers had served in WWII and a neighbor would often buzz the houses in a P-51 fighter and finish in a “Victory Spiral”. Bill was hooked on flying. Graduating from Penn State in 1968, Bill joined the air Force as an Aviation Cadet in Texas. Unfortunately his eye sight limited him to a Navigator and he completed his training in California. He was

assigned to C-130 Hercules, 4 engine turbo-prop military transport aircraft and assigned to the Tactical Air Command. (TAC) The C-130 is also the only military aircraft to remain in continuous production for 50 years. Unlike transports derived from passenger airliners, it was to be designed from the ground-up as a combat transport with loading from a ramp at the rear of the fuselage. The C-130F Hercules has performing takeoffs and landings aboard an aircraft carrier. Major Anderson was

involved in North Pole Low Level Grid Navigation. As a plane approaches the North Pole the compass becomes useless when you are over the Pole because the needle wants to point down instead of in the right direction. Using Grid Navigation solves this problem.

Major Anderson remembers when he was stationed in Tokyo, Japan. In 1967 there were 20 storms reached typhoon intensity, of which 5 reached super typhoon strength. Fearing the collapse of the hangers, several C-130s were outside. As the Typhoon intensified the C-130 began to fly! The crews manned the planes and started the engines, “flying” with the stick forward to keep the planes on the ground. However the 100,000 lbs. planes began “dancing” and were in danger of colliding. The crews had to “bail” (jumped) out to save their lives.

The C-130’s were used extensively in Vietnam. Their main duty was to transport supplies to out posts like Special Forces Camps near the Cambodian Border. The large rear ramp made for easy loading and unloading. The four turbo-prop engines could be run in reverse and stop the C-130 quickly when landing on these short, mostly dirt, runways. All the Navigator had to do was find these camps which usually had cloud cover and a hole in the clouds and the C-130 would spiral down and land. The 588th Combat Engineer Battalion constructed two Special Forces Camps with runways. These Camps were 2-3 miles from the Cambodian border and Viet Cong anti-aircraft guns. I was at Katum when one C-130 was hit. (READ the full story; (CTRL + Click)
