Special Presentation

"Grunts in the Vietnam Jungle"

Today we were treated to a first person recounting of what it was like being the "point" of the Army Spear in Vietnam. 1LT Frank

Pangborn, wearing his Vietnam combat uniform, served as a Platoon Leader

with C Company, 1st Battalion, 12th Regiment, 1st Cavalry Division (Airmobile).

After graduating from San Jose State, Frank was drafted into the Army. Following Basic training, and a member of the Honor Guard, Frank requested and 6 months later, graduated from Ft. Benning Officer Candidate School (OCS). Commissioned as a 2LT in the Infantry, he served

at Ft. Ord CA before shipping out to Vietnam. The 1st Air Cav. Div. included 16,000 men and 434 Helicopters. Designed to be airmobile meant they could be anywhere, anytime by using the helicopters. After landing, they served as regular infantry with the assistance of the helicopters for resupplies. A combat infantryman referred to himself with pride as a "Grunt".

The issue uniform was steel helmet (pot) green uniform with extra pockets, no flax jacket because of the heat and the extra weight, jungle boots with steel plates in the soles, and a backpack (rut sack) with 3 days rations. Water was always a premium, which meant they drank 3–5 canteens daily. Since the southern portion of Vietnam was relative flat and dense jungle, maps were photocopies of the actual terrain with grid zone markings overlaid.

The 1st Air Cav. was a part of the Cambodian Sanctuary Incursion, May 1970. Incursion is a short-term raid and not invasion because an invasion implies intent to stay. (Added in case any

1970s college-age students are still lost) This surprise attack found the Communist soldiers totally unprepared and resulted in reducing their combat effectiveness for at least a year. Many rifles, heavy machineguns, 1 ½ million rounds of ammunition, and 30 ton of rice and 9 tons of corn were liberated (stolen from the South Vietnamese). "It was the right thing to do".

A "typical" combat assault mission might follow this scenario; the landing zone (LZ) would be "prepped" (softened-up) by the Air Force, followed by artillery and helicopter gunships. As the troop carrying Huey helicopters approached with the door gunners firing M-60 machineguns, the troops would be sitting on the floor with their feet outside ready to jump off. Upon landing, they would jump off and take cover along the perimeter of the LZ to provide cover for the next helicopter.

Besides the Communist North Vietnamese and the Viet Cong, there were more dangers. The jungle was so thick that the going was slow with many tripping hazards from vines and roots. The wiggles included snakes, leeches, and ants. Moreover, being in a hot, humid climate, there was jungle rot and malaria. And

When a soldier completed their one-year tour, they could look forward to the Freedom Bird flight back to the States and a welcome home. (Sometimes)

Frank Pangborn is an author and has written about his Vietnam experiences. "Fear in the Wind" describes the day to day life of an infantryman. 'The Battle's Over" contains about 40 poems of Vietnam soldiers in combat. "This Country's beautiful, but oh the pain, it inflicted on the veteran. For all that I have been through, would someone acknowledge me? But, no one seemed to care about the soldier from across the sea." These books are in the FCOC library and can be checked out free.
